UPCOMING NEIGHBORHOOD EVENTS

- **Glenwood Place Neighborhood Association.....**

The Glenwood Place Neighborhood Association will be holding their initial meeting on Tuesday, July 15th at 6:30 PM at 311 Woodrow Avenue. The boundaries of Glenwood Place currently exist on the south side of Spring Street to Willow (south of East Market) and Silver (by Bicknell Park) east to Beharrell. There will be a representative from the Mayor's office at the meeting. Silver Grove Historian Jim Munford will be presenting a brief history of Glenwood Place.

- **Silver Grove Annual Street Festival.....September 20th (setup September 18th and 19th)**

Glenwood Place

Glenwood Place was the community mostly along McCulloch Pike (Market) east from Silver Street and north along Beharrell Ave. to Elm Street. In 1890, this area may have been known as East Park. A three room township school was located on the northeast corner of Best Ave. and Market Street until 1915, then the children all went to the new Silver Street School in the fall of 1916. In April of 1906, they voted on incorporation. The measure was barely defeated. In November of 1906, Silver Grove attempted to annex the area of Glenwood Place and failed. In November of 1914, Glenwood Place was annexed into the city of New Albany along with Silver Grove.

DID YOU KNOW

The Silver Grove Neighborhood Association is one of several neighborhood civic organizations in the City of New Albany made up of friends and neighbors working to make our City a better place to live. Our boundaries roughly encompass Charlestown Road to Spring Street and Silver Street to Silver Creek, which correspond to the historic Town of Silver Grove. Other neighborhood associations include Uptown Neighborhood Association (Spring to Charlestown Road, Vincennes to Silver St.); East Spring Neighborhood Association (Market to Elm, Vincennes to East 4th); and S. Ellen Jones Neighborhood Association, (boundaries include 8th Street on the west, Beeler on the North, and Vincennes on the East and southern border is the north side of Elm Street, including Cedar Bough Place). Our neighbors south of Silver Street and east of Silver Street will soon form the Glenwood Place Neighborhood Association.

Indiana Historical Society

Hosts Midwestern Roots 2008: Family History and Genealogy Conference

Indianapolis – Learn more about genealogy from some of the nation's leading experts and get the tools to implement that knowledge at Midwestern Roots 2008: Family History and Genealogy Conference, taking place Aug. 15-16. Sponsored by the Indiana Historical Society, the conference will take place at the Indianapolis Marriott East, located at 7202 East 21st St. in Indianapolis. Many pre-conference activities will take place at the Eugene and Marilyn Glick Indiana History Center, located at 450 W. Ohio St. in downtown Indianapolis.

Midwestern Roots will feature more than 30 presentations, covering topics ranging from DNA and genealogy to technology and methodology. The opening session of the conference will be led by James Madison, the Thomas and Kathryn Miller Professor of History at Indiana University (Bloomington), who will illuminate the importance and use of wartime letters for family history by relating stories from his new book *Slinging Doughnuts for the boys: An American Woman in World War II*.

Another featured presenter will be **Megan Smolenyak Smolenyak**, Chief Family Historian and North American spokesperson for Ancestry.com. Other notable national speakers appearing at Midwestern Roots include **Dick Eastman, Roberta Estes, Charles F. Kerchner, David Lifferth, Stephen Morse, Christine Rose, Beau Sharbough** and **Curt Witcher**.

In addition to the sessions, an exhibit hall will showcase vendors selling the latest products and tools for genealogists. The exhibit hall is free and open to the public on Friday and Saturday.

A pre-conference highlight on Thursday, Aug. 14, will be a panel discussion with some of the pioneers in genetic genealogy on its evolution, potential and present-day uses — panelists include Smolenyak, Estes and Kerchner. Other pre-conference activities include: tours of the William Henry Smith Memorial Library (History Center), the Indiana State Library and the Indiana State Archives; writing workshops on preparing family histories for publication; computer labs; and a workshop designed for library staff and volunteers who answer questions posed by genealogy patrons. The Genealogy Division of the Indiana State Library, the State Archives and the William Henry Smith Memorial Library also will be open later for research.

Cost for the basic two-day workshop (including lunches) is \$150 (\$125 for IHS members, \$75 for students), and single-day registration (including lunch is \$90 (\$75 for IHS members, \$45 for students). Additional pre-conference activities and workshops are available for a fee, and the Indiana Historical Society will offer three scholarships for graduate students to attend the conference.

Hornaday Rites Today

Natural Gas Pioneer Dies In Home Here

Funeral services for Fred Alvis Hornaday, 65, pioneer of the natural gas business in San Antonio, who died Tuesday at his home, 101 East King's Highway, will be conducted Thursday morning from the residence with Rev. P. B. Hill and Rev. Samuel D. Capers officiating.

Hornaday, who was a native of New Albany, Ind., was raised in Kansas City and came to San Antonio in 1908. He was the founder of the old Southern Natural Gas Company, and the movement he started for marketing of natural gas in the Southwest resulted in the present company of the United Gas System.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. F. A. Hornaday of San Antonio; two sons, Terry A. Hornaday of San Antonio and Fred A. Hornaday Jr. of Rio Grande City; two sisters, Mrs. Mollie Lamping and Miss Bertha Hornaday, both of Kansas City, Mo.; a grandson, Terry A. Hornaday Jr., and a granddaughter, Kay Gwendolyn Hornaday, both of this city.

Otto Charles Gohmann, 50, Burlingame mail carrier and World War veteran, died yesterday morning at his home, 839 Crossway road, after an illness of two months.

A native of New Albany, Ind., he had resided in Burlingame for 14 years and been in the postal service for 21 years. During the World War he took part in five major engagements.

He was a member of San Mateo council, No. 1346, Knights of Columbus; San Mateo post, No. 82, American Legion; Holy Name society of St. Catherine's church, and the Letter Carriers' association.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Marguerite Julia Gohmann; a son, James Louis Gohmann; two brothers, Fred J. Gohmann of New Albany, and Herman F. Gohmann of Yountville, and a sister, Sister Benedictina of Princeton, Ind.

Funeral services will be held at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning from the William Crosby & Co. chapel with requiem mass at 10 o'clock at St. Catherine's church. Interment will be in the National cemetery, San Francisco presidio.

Wills – Floyd and Harrison County, Indiana

GOTTLIEB EISMANN, WILL

Date: Sept. 14, 1855

I, **Gottlieb Eismann**, NEW ALBANY, FLOYD CO. IN. being of sound mind and disposing memory do make and publish this to be my last Will & Testament, to-wit:

1st, I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife **Christena Charlotte Eismann** all my Estate, both real and personal, all rights, credits monies and effects of which I may die seized, subject to the payment of my just debts and the reasonable cost and expenses of a plain set of Gravestones to be placed over my grave with my name, and the date of my birth and of my death cut thereon; To hold the same to her during her natural life, and I hereby give and confer upon my said dear wife full power and authority to sell and convey any and all real estate that she may deem proper, either at public or private sale, to raise money for the payment of said debts. Said **Christena C. Eismann** is also to purchase and pay for a suitable Graveyard out of said bequest.

2nd. I give and bequeath to my son **Christian Eismann** the undivided 1/5th of my estate remaining at the death of my said wife.

3rd. I give and bequeath to my son **George L. Eismann** the undivided 1/5th of my estate remaining at the death of my wife.

4th Having made to **Augustus Eismann** advances to pay for 120 acres of land and farming utensils, etc., which with the interest therein to this date amounts to over \$900. I require him to pay said \$900 to my wife at my death, or that he pay the interest therein semiannually and the principal when she needs the same, and I give and bequeath to my said son **Augustus Eismann** the 1/5th of my estate remaining at the death of my said wife, subject to a deduction for so much of said \$900, and interest therein, as shall be unpaid at the death of said wife.

5th, **Charles Eismann** having received \$180 paid by me for stock in the plank road, in his name, and I paid as security for said **Charles** to **Esquire Childs** about \$55, unless paid amounts shall be paid me by said **Charles**, I wish them considered as advancements to him, and require him to pay the same to my wife at my death, or that he pay the interest therein semi-annually, and the principal when she needs the same.

I give and bequeath to my said son **Charles Eismann** the 1/5th of my estate remaining at the death of my dear wife, subject to a deduction of so much of said advancements to him, and interest thereon, as shall be unpaid at the death of my wife, and the above bequest to said **Charles** is upon the condition that he shall not go back to live with his wife, nor marry a member of **William Budd**'s family, and if he does go back to his present wife, marry a member of the **Budd** family or die without other heir than his children by his present wife, the above bequest to be equally divided between his brothers and sisters or the survivors of them as herein provided.

6th, I have advanced to my daughter **Christena Underhill** \$100, and I wish her to pay said \$100 to my dear wife at my death, or that she pay the interest thereon, semiannually, and the principal when needed, and desiring her to have the benefit of 1/5th of my estate remaining at the death of said wife.

I direct my Executors hereinafter named to loan out the 1/5th of said remainder after deducting said advancement and interest unpaid at the death of my wife for the best rates he can on good security or place the same in Bank or Insurance Company on interest, and pay the interest thereon semiannually to said **Christena Underhill** during her life, and at her death he shall pay said interest to the Guardian of her children, but in case of the death of her husband **William Underhill**, or in case of her obtaining a divorce from her said husband, then my Executors shall pay to said **Christena Underhill** said money or securities, and any monies or property according to said **Christena** by the death of any of the above named devisees shall be in like manner bound by my said Executor, and the interest paid in like manner, and in case of the death of said **Christena** before her husband, then I direct said principal sum to be paid by my Executor to the children of said **Christena Underhill** in equal proportions on the attaining their majority, that is each one his or her share when he attain his majority.

7th, If any of the above named devisee shall bring suit to break this Will or against each other in the settlement of this estate, the one so suing shall forfeit thereby his rights under this Will, and I hereby revoke any bequest herein to that devisee bringing such suit, and give and bequeath his or her share to the other devisees named in this Will in equal proportions.

Lastly, I hereby revoke all Wills by me at any time heretofore made and nominate and appoint my dear wife **Christena Eismann** and my friend **Augustus Bradley** Executrix and Executor of this my last Will & Testament this 14th of Sept. 1855. **Gottlieb Eismann** (seal)

To my beloved Father-in-law, **James Montgomery**, I give and bequeath my gold watch and chain, and my writing desk.

To my beloved Mother-in-law **E. O. Montgomery**, I give and bequeath the care and possession (as stated above) during her natural life, of my only and darling child; and all those articles of household furniture which were the property of her daughter **Mary**, as will be useful and serve as mementoes of **Marshall & Mary**.


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
